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10 SEAFARERS KIDNAPPED FROM PRODUCT TANKER OFF NIGERIA^{ts}

Ten seafarers are reported to have been kidnapped by pirates from the product tanker Vemahope off Nigeria.

An unknown number of pirates in speedboat are reported to have boarded the 6,152 dwt product tanker Vemahope and kidnapped 10 seafarers, according to Dryad Global.

The Greek-owned tanker was 178 nm SSE of Lagos at the time of the incident.

"With the kidnap of 10 crew from the Vemahope the total number of crew kidnapped from vessels operating in West Africa within 2020 is increased to 42 personnel.

"The incident is located 39nm NE of an incident involving a vessel being fired upon in February 20 and 101nm NW of what appeared to be a focus of incident reporting within 2019," Dryad said

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DEMURRAGE, STORAGE WAIVER ENDED APRIL 27, SAYS NPA OFFICIAL

An official of the Nigerian Ports Authority (NPA) has said that the suspension of demurrage and storage charges at the nation's seaports ended on April 27, 2020. "The statement (issued by NPA) directed all terminal operators to extend the suspension of all applicable terminal storage fees on consignments for another 14 days elective April 13, 2020. This means that the directive lasted till April 27, 2020.

"However, the Managing Director's office has not issued any further directive with regards to the waiver, so the terminal date is April 27," the official, who did not want to be identified because he had not been authorised to speak on the matter, said.

He said NPA would issue an official statement on the matter soon.

The NPA had on March 24 announced suspension of demurrage and storage charges on imported cargoes in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic in Nigeria. With the expiration of the waiver on April 27, normal charges are expected to resume.

UNION WARNS MARITIME EMPLOYERS AGAINST CUTTING WORKERS' SALARIES

The Maritime Workers Union of Nigeria has issued a strong warning to employers of labour in the industry against cutting salaries and allowances in the name of COVID-19.

The President of the union, Adewale Adeyanju, gave this warning in a May Day message on Friday, saying that any attempt to do so would be resisted by the union.

Adeyanju said workers did not deserve to be punished for the COVID-19 lockdown since it was not their fault.

He said the union had received information that some managements in the ports had issued internal memos on planned pay cut.

He said, "In very clear terms, we condemn this attempt to turn workers' right on its head for the pecuniary gains of management without recourse to normal consideration and processes.

"We find it strange that workers will be subjected to punishment for a situation that is entirely out of their scope of control.

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VLCCS: CHARTERERS REGAIN CONTROL

A quieter week in both Middle East and Atlantic regions has allowed charterers to regain control as tonnage availability increases, with the longer-term effects awaited of OPEC+ cuts, storage period charters and a fragile oil price alongside the shorter-term issues brought about by Ramadan and the various national holidays. In the Middle East rates for 270,000mt to China have fallen 70 points with a trader's relet reported to Unipec at WS85 while rates for 280,000mt to US Gulf via cape/cape routing also took a hammering, with a Chevron relet reported to Valero at WS40, down from WS100 a week ago. In West Africa, little activity was seen in the market for 260,000mt to China, although some of the failed fixtures from last week have been revived and renegotiated downwards with rates now assessed in the high WS90s and downward pressure continuing to be applied. There was very little activity in the Gulf of Mexico, however rate assessments have been revised to the \$12m mark for 270,000mt USG/China voyages, \$1.4m lower than a week ago..

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
